Dear Eric,

Here's the SHORT response to your question:

I think the Logical Rorschach is a pretty good idea and a step in the right direction.

Here the LONG response......

My co-authors and I have consistently stated since 1996 that Form Quality and Deviant Verbalizations on the Rorschach bear a valid relationship to schizophrenia and some other disorders. We also believe, by the way, that the Rorschach has potential as a "back-up" measure of intelligence, when better measures such as the WAIS and WISC are impractical.

In our opinion, the Comprehensive System is largely a waste of time. It's loaded with scores that can't be scored accurately and whose validity has never been established. It's time consuming and cumbersome to use, and its norms are seriously in error, so that normal people look "sick." (For a summary, see our recent review "The Scientific Status of Projective Techniques" in Psychological Science in the Public Interest by Lilienfeld, Wood, and Garb. It can be downloaded free at http://www.psychologicalscience.org/newsresearch/publications/journals/p spi1 2.html)

In the Logical Rorschach, Ed Wagner has taken the "logical" step of trimming the Rorschach down to its best-validated scores. With Ed's approach, only Form Quality and Deviant Verbalizations are scored and calculated. The psychologist doesn't have to waste time on arcane and useless issues, such as pondering whether a particular response is FY or YF, or calculating Adj D.

While I think that the Logical Rorschach is a big step in the right direction, there are several things to keep in mind.

(1) It's not clear that the Logical Rorschach's approach to scoring Form Quality and Deviant Verbalizations is the absolute best approach possible. Researchers need to compare the reliability and validity of the Logical Rorschach variables with comparable variables in other Rorschach systems (Thought Disorder Index, F+%, X+%), to see which versions of Form Quality and Deviant Verbalizations are easiest to score and most valid. (2) The norms for the Logical Rorschach are based on limited groups, and need to be cross-checked in research with other groups. (3) More validity studies need to be done -- I hope that grad students looking for dissertation topics will start looking at the Logical Rorschach.
