Maybe I am wrong but I remember I read a book of Françoise Minkowska when I was a student. Minkowska (wife of the phenomenological psychiatrist Eugène Minkowski) interpreted the Rorschach by her own approach that was based on "phenomenology of the form", that I suppose may be close to the concept of "perceptual-idiographic". If memory serves, Minkowska was interested in the interpretation of idiographic Rorschach responses related to the perceptual features rather than the classic idiographic, content-based approach. The book was in French, published in the 50s and I remember I read it in an university library in Paris. Fortunately, I have much more vivid memories of Paris and other things outside the library :-)

Maybe someone of the list could confirm my memory (Helge, are you still there? Alberto?).

Yes Piero, actually your memory is quite good. The full reference is: Minkowska, F. (1978) Le Rorschach: A la recherche du monde des formes [The Rorschach: In search of the world of forms] (reprint); Paris: Desclée de Brouwer (Orig. publ. in 1956). It's a collection of her most important articles. Her husband and herself were friends of Hermann Rorschach, and particularly the brother of the psychiatrist the neurologist M. Minkowski.

I am just reviewing her work for my Doctoral Dissertation. She developed a phenomenological approach to the method, made some important contributions (particularly in the study of schizophrenia and epilepsy which in her view constitute two poles, the one characterized by a 'splitting' procedure and the other by a 'binding' one visible in their Rorschach responses) and was head of a school in France, the "Groupe Franziska Minkowska" with their own publication (the 'Cahiers').

Although I consider her contribution important I don't agree with all of her opinions, for ex. her criticism of the psychoanalytic Rorschach approach (Zulliger) which she erroneously identified exclusively with content analysis (content-idiographic). In this sense I couldn't agree more with you Piero, the perceptual-idiographic dimension exists and furthermore I believe it was the original view of Hermann Rorschach himself (also Minkowska's opinion), which has been lost over the decades. A good example that at the same time demonstrates her mistaken criticism, is Zulliger's (direct disciple of Rorschach) finding of a predominant W-type in 'oral' characters, D-type in 'genital' characters, Dd-type in 'anal' characters, and S-type in 'aggressive' characters - all of them idiographic attitudes of the respective personalities: this is also exactly the approach Piotrowski defended and promoted coining the term 'Perceptanalysis' (using as model the term 'Psychoanalysis'). In my humble opinion, the restrictive identification of idiographic possibilities with content analysis is a mistake maintained since longtime from different, even opposing schools (extremes meet).
